#### **FLORAL ART: DEFINITIONS & GENERAL RULES**

AN EXHIBIT under NAFAS Standards must be composed of natural plant materials, with or without accessories, contained within a space as specified in the show schedule. The plant materials do not have to be grown by the exhibitor (apart from Class 58 – From My Own Garden).

#### DISQUALIFICATION

Under NAFAS rules disqualification will take place for the following reasons.

- 1. Failure to comply with any specific requirements of a class as stated in a show schedule, i.e. the measurements or the components.
- 2. Inclusion of any fresh plant material that does not have its roots or the cut ends of its stems in water or water-retaining material. (For exclusions see the NAFAS Handbook of Schedule Definitions).
- 3. Inclusion of artificial plant material, (unless specifically allowed by a show schedule).

For further details and definitions please refer to the NAFAS Competitions Manual" 3<sup>rd</sup> Edition 2015 in accordance with which all classes will be judged, a copy of which may be seen on application to the Secretary.

Exhibits in this section will be judged in accordance with the NAFAS Competition Manual 2015 (see definitions and rules on page 22 in this schedule).

The competitor's own containers should be used for all classes.

#### The Holman's Cup

Awarded to the best exhibit in Floral Art.

#### The Allison Challenge Cup

Awarded to the exhibitor with the most points in Floral Art.

#### Class

58. A parallel design of fresh plant material not to exceed 40 cm. in length, 20 cm. in depth and height unrestricted.

To be viewed and judged from the front.

59. A pave/tapestry eco-arrangement of fresh plant material to include some edible flowers and herbs for all round effect. No floral foam or plastic to be used and not to exceed 30 cm. in any direction.

To be viewed and judged all round.

The term 'pave' describes a style where the flowers are arranged closely together, resembling a paved surface. For example a pavé rose arrangement uses roses cut to a uniform length.

60. The Chapman Vase.

"From My Own Garden" an exhibit of fresh garden plant material from your own garden. Not to exceed 45 cm.in any direction.

To be viewed and judged from the front.

61. 'Summer Sun' an exhibit of fresh plant material in shades of one colour. Foliage and accessories are permitted. Not to exceed 50 cm. in any direction.

To be viewed and judged from the front.

62. A miniature arrangement of fresh plant material for all round effect. Not to exceed 10 cm. in any direction.

To be viewed and judged all round.

#### **DOMESTIC**

Exhibits in this section will be judged on: appearance, taste and texture.

Awarded to the exhibitor with the most points in the Domestic Section.

#### The Doris Day Tankard

Awarded to the best exhibit in the Domestic Section.

- 63. A Victoria sponge sandwich with jam filling.
- 64. 5 savoury scones specify the flavour on exhibit slip.
- 65. A gluten free cake specify flavour on exhibit slip.
- 66. **The Rupert Trophy GENTLEMEN ONLY** 6 shortbread fingers.
- 67. 5 cheese biscuits.
- 68. A Swiss roll specify flavour on exhibit slip.

#### **Tips for the Show Bench 2024**

In addition to these tips please read the show schedule and Society's rules as set out on the inside cover.

#### **Flowers**

<u>Roses</u> Should only have one bloom per stem, whether for scent or the vase of 3 stems (excluding cluster flowered class).

<u>Dahlias</u> Blooms should face the front, preferably with some foliage on the stem, and no buds.

<u>Gladioli</u> An erect spike with fresh, unblemished blooms; ideally one third in full flower, one third with buds in colour and one third in green bud.

#### <u>Vegetables</u>

<u>Peas & Beans</u> (in their pods) Pods should be cut with a short stalk and be uniform in size, colour and maturity (this applies to all vegetables and fruit). <u>Onions & Shallots</u> (prepared) Tops neatly tied and trimmed. Do not remove too much of the outer skin and measure carefully. Sand may be used to display.

<u>Garlic</u> Solid, clean, uniform, well ripened bulbs with thin necks, dried stem approximately 2.5 cm.

**Rhubarb** Fresh not cut (i.e. with heel still on), leaf trimmed to approximately 7.5 cm.

<u>Tomatoes</u> Rich colour with fresh calyx and stalk intact. Truss is 1 single truss (not branched).

<u>Potatoes</u> Medium sized (175-225 gm.) uniform in shape, clean skin (never scrub the skin).

<u>Courgettes</u> Young, uniform in shape and colour, length approximately 15 cm. Round cultivars approximately 15 cm. with or without flowers.

<u>Cucumbers</u> Young, green, straight and well matched with short stalks. With or without flowers.

<u>Culinary Herbs</u> Fresh, healthy, clean leaves with no signs of disease or age. <u>Root Vegetables</u> (other than those mentioned) must have their leaves cut off, leaving approximately 7.5 cm. of stalk.

#### <u>Fruit</u>

<u>Currants</u> A strig with full compliment of ripe currants, stalks fresh and intact. <u>Berries</u> Ripe and no blemishes, with green stalks and calyx attached.

#### **Domestic**

<u>Jams, Jellies & Marmalades</u> Jars should be clear and clean. Please do not use old chutney iars for iams.

<u>Chutney</u> Label should state date made and it must be at least two months old.





#### How to grow a potato — Instruction for Children's Class D

#### **Equipment:**

- 1 seed potato from Elham Garden Society
- 1 x egg box
- Hammer and nail—ADULT USE ONLY
- 1 x builder's bucket
- A trowel
- Compost or soil



Put the potatoes into an egg carton, with their eyes at the top. The eyes of a potato are the little indents or pits you see on their skins. Leave them in a cool, dry place or windowsill for about 4 weeks until they grow shoots. This process is called 'chitting'.



Ask an adult to make some small holes (about 1cm.) in the base of the bucket, using a hammer and a nail. Once chitting is complete, add the compost or soil up to one-third of the bucket.

Very gently push the potato into the compost with the shoots pointing up. Add a little more soil to cover the potato. Water your potato every three days.



As the plants grow, shoots will appear out of the compost. When this happens cover them with more soil, so they are just buried. Add more compost every time the shoots appear, until the bucket is completely full. The plants will continue to grow and grow.




Place the bucket outside where it can get plenty of light. Keep the compost well-watered, especially if the weather gets

If any potatoes appear make sure you cover them again with compost.

If you leave them in the sunlight they will turn green and green potatoes are poisonous.
